There are several approved medications for IBS that may improve patients' bowel habits, but this investigational drug also attempts to address a significant unmet medical need for IBS-associated pain relief.

Doctors are studying an investigational drug for IBS-D

Local doctors are looking for people to volunteer for a clinical research study of an investigational drug for irritable bowel syndrome with diarrhea (IBS-D). (“Investigational” means it’s new and not yet approved or available for use by the public.) The main purpose of this study is to find out how IBS-D patients are affected by this drug for IBS-D symptoms including abdominal (belly) pain and discomfort, and sudden urges to have bowel movements.

If you volunteer and qualify for this study, you’ll receive the following at no cost:

- Study medication for IBS-D or placebo (a pill that looks like BOS-589 but has no active ingredients)
- Study-related care from a doctor

Health insurance and doctor referrals aren’t required to participate.

Clinical research is important and confidential

A clinical research study is a research project done with human volunteers to learn more about new drugs and treatments. Some volunteers are interested in access to investigational drugs or treatments. Others volunteer want to help advance science. Whatever your reason for participating, we’ll closely monitor your health and protect your privacy.

Important information about this study

You must meet the following basic criteria:

- Are 18 to 65 years of age
- Have had IBS-D (irritable bowel syndrome with frequent diarrhea) for at least 6 months
- No history of inflammatory or immune-mediated GI disorders including, but not limited to, inflammatory bowel disease (Crohn’s disease, ulcerative colitis, microscopic colitis, and celiac disease)

Doctors will also check other requirements to make sure you qualify for this study.

Remember to ask questions!

Your study doctor will explain the potential benefits and risks of being in this research study. Please use this opportunity to ask questions. You may also take this brochure with you and talk to your doctor to help you decide if this research study is right for you.

How can I get started?

STEP 1

Contact our study coordinator

To learn more, contact our study coordinator listed on the back of this brochure. The study coordinator will give you information about the study and help determine if you might qualify.

STEP 2

Determine eligibility/give informed consent

At the doctor’s office, our study staff will explain the study procedures and the study’s possible benefits and risks. They’ll also ask some health questions and may refer you for further medical evaluation to make sure you meet the requirements for the study. To join our study, you must read and sign a document called an informed consent form to show that you understand the study and what’s required of you.

STEP 3

Participate

If eligible, you’ll enter the study and make regular visits to our offices. The staff will work with you to find convenient times for these visits. If for some reason you need to leave the study, you may do so at any time, for any reason.
